



Good Careers Academy accredited programs are structured to help minimum wage earners advance up the ladder of economic opportunity.

In today's economy, there is a significant gap between the types of jobs available and a skilled workforce available to fill open positions - with almost one-fourth of employed adults having to work multiple jobs in order to earn a living wage. Goodwill San Antonio's certification programs upskill a population struggling to move beyond a minimum wage job, providing career advancement to individuals and a more thriving economy to our community.

TRAINED IN HIGH DEMAND CAREERS

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Growing up in Virginia, David found himself lost and disconnected at an early age. Broken family relationships impacted him throughout his teen years leaving him uncertain as to what the next chapters would hold.

David graduated high school and was enthusiastic to attend a local community college. College meant he had an opportunity for a fresh start and the chance to meet new people. But after three years in the classroom, college stopped being interesting. Coming to the realization he enjoyed working more, David's ambition to acquire a post-secondary education was no longer a priority.

A relationship and a desire for change brought David to San Antonio. To make ends meet, he obtained a full-time job at a community bank where he obtained both technical and soft skills. However, **the constant demands and stress associated with working in a call center environment was more than he could bear**. The stress of his job, coupled with the desire to be back in Virginia closer to his mom, triggered severe anxiety.

David eventually left the company, but at the cost of his mental well-being and damaged self-confidence.

After resigning from his call center position, David struggled to find employment. With only a high school diploma in hand, he received phone calls from only three out of one hundred applications he submitted. Financial burdens were piling up. Desperate to find his life's path, **David discovered the Administrative Assistant program being offered by Goodwill San Antonio's Good Careers Academy**. He registered and began classes with the simple notion that earning a certification meant he

Although David had already acquired many of the skills being taught in the class, the Administrative Assistant program taught him more than he ever expected. For David, the class was not so much about the content, but rather the accomplishment and experience. He and his fellow classmates became a family. They supported one another both in and out of the classroom. Organically, David became a mentor imparting his knowledge to others who needed additional assistance. **David completed his externship and graduated Valedictorian of his class.**

Following completion of his certification, David was hired by Goodwill San Antonio's Business Services division where he works at Randolph Air Force Base as a Records Management Support Associate. It was a call he never expected, but one he is extremely thankful to have received.

Appreciative for the opportunity to realize his potential through meaningful employment in a supportive work environment, David now has everything he needs to lead a successful and stable life.

STORY OF COMMITMENT: Mary

When Mary made the difficult decision to resign from a management position she had worked diligently over eight years to achieve due to decreasing mobility, she was fearful for what the future would hold. "When your ability to work becomes limited, it affects the way you think. You wonder how you are going to be able to feed yourself or keep a roof over your head. Uncertainty is a very scary place."

Mary had been diagnosed with severe osteoarthritis causing her to limp when she

walks. In time, she would continue to lose mobility as the disease would eventually further penetrate her knees, hips, and back. With her daily production on the decline, Mary knew she would not be able to keep up with the expectations of the physically demanding job she loved in the restaurant industry.

Osteoarthritis was not something Mary planned for, however, she could either view herself as a victim or **stand up and do something about her circumstances.**

Although her age coupled with her disability would unquestionably place her at a competitive disadvantage when finding alternative employment, Mary resigned from her position and applied to Goodwill San Antonio based on referrals from former customers.

Now working as a Medical Records Associate for Goodwill, Mary feels as though she is contributing more to her community than ever before. She is part of a team that prepares, scans, and digitizes hundreds of thousands of medical records for U.S. Air Force veterans. Their work expedites the time for the Department of Veterans Affairs to process medical claims ensuring veterans receive their benefits.

Since Mary has been employed, Goodwill has supported her each step of the way; helping her learn new skills and making accommodations to help ease the physical challenges associated with her disability.

Proud of the new position she holds, Mary is thriving in a work environment that focuses on her abilities such as her **Capability** to do the job, **Dependability** to show up on time ready to work, **Reliability** to get the job done correctly, and her **Flexibility** to work with others to achieve a common goal. Mary no longer feels different or inadequate; but instead, is recognized for her contributions that make a difference to the military men and women she is serving.

"I am employed with someone who understands, and is willing to work with me. Goodwill stops hopelessness. There has to be a place to turn before you become hopeless."

Driven by a strong work ethic and a positive attitude, Mary's goals are set on progressing within her current position. She is keenly aware people are counting on her to get the job done, and it is that sense of purpose that makes her feel valued – not for what she has, but for who she is. As Mary proudly states, she is the "mission fulfilled."
